

Plagiarism & How to Avoid It

The Bible teaches the importance of truthfulness and integrity...

Pro 12:22 Lying lips [are] abomination to the LORD: but they that deal truly [are] his delight.

Claiming credit for another's work is a form of falsehood that contradicts this principle. Additionally, plagiarism disregards the biblical command to respect others and their labor (1 Timothy 5:18: "The labourer is worthy of his reward"). By failing to attribute credit where it is due, plagiarists not only steal intellectual property but also violate the moral responsibility to honor the efforts of others.

Plagiarism's immorality lies in its exploitation of another's creativity without permission or acknowledgment, akin to theft. This act is inconsistent with the biblical mandate against stealing, as outlined in Ephesians 4:28 "Let him that stole steal no more: but rather let him labour, working with [his] hands the thing which is good, that he may have to give to him that needeth.." By taking someone's intellectual work without consent or recognition, a plagiarist engages in a form of theft that devalues both the original creator's efforts and their own moral character. Upholding honesty and giving credit fosters a culture of mutual respect and accountability, which is essential for personal and spiritual growth.

Avoiding Plagiarism When Writing an Essay

One effective strategy to avoid plagiarism is developing strong note-taking habits. While researching, writers should clearly distinguish between their own thoughts, direct quotes, and

paraphrased ideas. Using quotation marks for direct quotes and documenting the source immediately prevents confusion when integrating material into the essay. Additionally, paraphrasing should involve more than just rewording; it requires reinterpreting the original idea in one's own voice and citing the source. Tools such as citation management software or online resources can help streamline the process of organizing and citing sources accurately.

Time management is another critical factor in avoiding plagiarism. Procrastination often leads to rushed work, increasing the likelihood of copying and pasting without proper attribution. Starting the essay early provides ample time for thorough research, careful writing, and proper citation. **Writers should also make use of plagiarism detection tools to ensure the originality of their work before submission. These tools compare the essay against a database of published works to identify any unintentional overlaps.**
